Suicide Prevention, Awareness, and Screening

5 6 The School Board recognizes that suicide is one of the leading causes of death for Florida's 7 youth. To address the prevalence of student suicide, the Board believes there must be a 8 partnership between families, the community, and schools. It is critical for families and 9 community members to communicate with and provide information to school staff to identify 10 students at risk of suicide. The School Board is committed to protecting the health, safety, 11 and welfare of its students and school community.

This policy supports federal, state and local efforts to provide education on youth suicide awareness and prevention; establish methods of prevention, intervention, and response to suicide or suicide attempt; and to promote access to suicide awareness and prevention resources. As mandated by law, the approved instructional materials provided by the Florida Office of Suicide Prevention will be provided to all instructional and administrative staff. Further, student personnel services staff, will be responsible for providing suicide prevention and awareness training and resources to students and staff.

21 (1) Signs of Suicidal Ideation:

All school personnel should be alert to signs of suicide ideation and to students who threaten or attempt suicide. Suicide ideation is the process of fantasizing, planning, practicing, and motivating oneself to commit suicide. Any such signs or the report of such signs from another student or staff member should be taken with the utmost seriousness. Families, community members, and students are encouraged to report any such signs to the Principal.

(2) Suicide Risk Assessment:

All schools and local mobile response teams shall use the same suicide risk assessment instruments approved by the FLDOE pursuant to F.S. 1012.583. Only school-based mental health service providers who have been trained in the use of the instruments utilized by the District may give a risk assessment to a student expressing suicidal ideation or suicidal intent.

A "school-based mental health services provider" means a school psychologist certified under F.A.C. 6A- 4.0311, a school social worker certified under F.A.C. 6A-4.035, a school counselor certified under F.A.C. 6A- 4.0181, or a mental health professional licensed under F.S. Chapters 490 or 491, who is employed or contracted by the District to provide mental health services in its schools

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If a trained school-based mental health services provider is unavailable, a contracted
certified or licensed mental health provider may evaluate students in the District for suicide
risk, including the mobile response teams serving the District.

When a suicide risk assessment results in the initiation of an involuntary examination, the Principal is required to make a reasonable attempt, as outlined in Board Policy 4.222, to notify the student's parent(s) before the student is removed from school, school transportation, or a school-sponsored activity, unless notification is delayed pursuant to F.S. 1002.20.

When a suicide risk assessment results in a change in related services or monitoring, a student's parent(s) must be notified as soon as possible.

(3) Authority:

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In compliance with state law and regulations, and in support of the district's suicide prevention measures, information received in confidence from a student may be revealed to the student's parents/guardians, the principal or other appropriate authority when the health, welfare or safety of the student or any other person is deemed to be at risk.

The superintendent or designee shall develop administrative procedures for implementation of this policy, including student and staff training, providing recommended guidelines for responding to a suicide threat.

(4) Guidelines:

The district shall utilize a multifaceted approach to suicide prevention which integrates school and community-based supports. The district shall notify district employees, students and parents/guardians of this policy and shall post the policy on the district's website.

- 76 (5) Suicide Awareness and Prevention Education:
 - (a) Protocols for Administration of Student Education:

Students shall receive age-appropriate education on the importance of safe and healthy choices, coping strategies, how to recognize risk factors and warning signs, as well as help-seeking strategies for self or others including how to engage school resources and refer friends for help. Lessons shall contain information on comprehensive health and wellness, including emotional, behavioral, and social skills development.

- (b) Training:
- 89 Professional development training in youth suicide prevention shall be 90 provided for student services staff, administration, and instructional staff.

91 92 Further, additional professional development training regarding risk assessment 93 and intervention shall be provided to school mental health professionals 94 and school nurses. 95 96 The training identified herein shall foster an understanding of how to use an 97 intervention procedure which includes the following: 98 99 Step 1 – Stabilization 100 Step 2 – Assessment of the Risk Step 3 – Use of Appropriate Risk Procedure 101 Step 4 – Communication with Appropriate Parties 102 103 Step 5 – Follow-up 104 105 (c) Student Identification Card: 106 107 All student identification cards must include the telephone numbers for national or 108 statewide crisis and suicide hotlines. 109 110 Resources for Parent/Guardians: (d) 111 112 The district may provide parents/guardians with resources including, but not limited to, health promotion and suicide risk, including characteristics and 113 114 warning signs; and information about local behavioral/mental health resources. 115 116 Methods of Prevention: (e) 117 118 The methods of prevention utilized by the district include, but are not limited to, early identification and support for students at risk; education for students, staff 119 120 and parents/guardians; and delegation of responsibility for planning and 121 coordination of suicide prevention efforts. 122 123 (f) Early Identification and Referral: 124 125 Early identification of individuals with one or more suicidal risk factors or of 126 individuals exhibiting warning signs, is crucial to the district's suicide 127 prevention efforts. To promote awareness, district employees, students and 128 parents/guardians should be educated about suicidal risk factors and warning 129 signs. Any district employee who has identified a student with one or more risk 130 factors or who has an indication that a student may be contemplating suicide, 131 shall refer the student for further assessment and intervention. 132 Methods for Intervention: 133 (q) 134 135 For student at risk, the methods of intervention utilized by the district include, but 136 are not limited to, responding to suicide threats, suicide attempts in school, 137 suicide attempts outside of school, and completed suicide. Suicide intervention

138 procedures shall address the development of an emotional or mental health 139 safety plan for students identified as being at increased risk of suicide. 140 141 (h) Response to Suicide or Suicide Attempt: 142 143 The first school personnel on the scene of a suicide or suicide attempt must 144 follow the school entity's crisis response procedures, and shall immediately 145 notify the principal or designee. The school entity will immediately notify the parents or guardians of the affected student(s). 146 147 148 (i) School Safety Plan: 149 150 1. Reporting Procedures: 151 152 Effective documentation assists in preserving the safety of the student and 153 ensuring communication among school staff, parents/guardians and mental health service providers. 154 155 156 District employees shall be responsible for effective documentation of 157 incidents involving suicide prevention, intervention and response pursuant 158 to Board Policy 4.222. 159 160 Suicide Prevention Certified School: (6) 161 162 A school must meet the following criteria to be considered a "Suicide (a) 163 Prevention Certified School": 164 165 1. All instructional personnel at the school must complete two hours of approved youth suicide awareness, and prevention training, and repeat 166 167 that training every three years. 168 169 2. The requirement for all instructional personnel to complete youth 170 suicide awareness and prevention training is included in the district's 171 continuing education or master in-service plan; 172 173 3. The school has at least two school-based mental health service providers 174 that are qualified to conduct a suicide risk assessment using an FDOE-175 approved screening instrument; and 176 177 4. The school or district has a policy requiring the use of an approved 178 suicide risk assessment instrument administered by a school-based 179 mental health services provider prior to requesting or initiating an 180 involuntary examination due to concerns about a student's suicide risk. 181 182 (b) The Superintendent will notify the FDOE of all schools qualifying for this 183 designation. 184
